


Enjoy the newsletter and have a restful Easter holiday. Ramadan Mubarak to all those celebrating this special time.

Inclusion & Resource Base

This term we have focused on developing our learners' understanding of our school core values of Respect, Commitment and Achievement.

We have shown commitment by encouraging learners to join us for additional intervention and Homework Club from 8.00 every morning. Several of our learners have taken this opportunity to do their additional learning for GCSE History and Geography and this has seen them make steady progress in their assessments.

We also have structured social time before school where our neurodiverse young people can take time out with others for a game of pool and chess or just a chat with familiar adults. We're particularly excited that we've developed a relationship with Games Workshop and, by the time you'll have read this, some of our Year 8 Resource Base learners will have become immersed in the exciting world of Warhammer.

Our structured social time takes place at lunch and break and Mr. Shields, our visiting SEND tutor, continues the fun and games and is currently engaging some of our harder to reach young people with his expertise in Stop Motion animation.

We'd like to say 'thank you' to Mrs Allso who has taken on the mantle of Occupational Therapy Champion and has undergone training with the OT service to learn how to better support the physical development of our learners and help them realise the link between physical strength and mental wellbeing. Mrs Allso has also worked with Ms McKeon to revamp the HAL curriculum for Resource Base learners, to ensure that it is as inclusive as possible and gives all our young people a sense of achievement through the study of AQA Unit Awards.

All Resource Base learners have been successfully awarded unit awards from pre-entry level Functional Skills, to pre-GCSE English Literature.


We've also welcomed Ms Chohan, Ms Aftab and Ms Begum to our team who are doing additional close support for some of our most vulnerable learners.



- Tutor groups 9-6 and 9-8 who both have the highest overall attendance so far, this academic year







Ninestiles learners, Trinity Mooney (Year 9) and Ellie-Mae Roney (Year 7), are both very active members of their local community youth club at the Fox Hollies Forum, known as Youth Project Acocks Green. The group's mission is to 'make Acocks Green

a great place to be a young person'. Trinity and Ellie-Mae regularly volunteer at fund-raising events, and welcome members of the community to events held there. During the summer of 2022, Trinity and Ellie-Mae successfully bid for funding to run a oneday social action event based around Mental Health support in schools. With help from teaching staff and contacts of the Fox Hollies Forum and youth group, the girls organised a Mental Health Support Evening at Ninestiles on 31st January. The girls wanted the event to be very inclusive and open to everyone: those with mental health challenges and their friends and families who support them. It was a wonderful evening. Over 70 people attended from their own school, other local schools, and members of the community, to learn about the importance of protecting your mental health, and ways in which you could do that. 



We've had an exciting and busy term in English

The term began with a Year 10 public speaking workshop led by Speak Out, in which thirty of our Year 10 students were nominated by their teachers to participate in a full day of oracy. The day culminated with the students giving some fantastic speeches. Our top seven students were then asked to write an extra speech and participate in an assembly final. Our winner and runner-up will now be judged by an expert panel and, if successful, will represent the school at the national final in June at Birmingham University. We look forward to updating you with our progress!

A small group of outstanding Year 11 learners also represented us in the regional final of the ESU MACE competition, which was held in January at Solihull School. The students had already survived one gruelling round of this intense competition, but they just missed out this time. We are extremely proud of their accomplishment in reaching this round against primarily college teams.

One of the most exciting days on the English calendar this term was our trip to the Belgrade Theatre with Year 10 to watch a superb production of An Inspector Calls. Our learners were an absolute credit to the school and with their PPE assessment covering the play in the summer term it was a welcome revision tool.

Our KS3 students are working diligently on challenging schemes, with Year 7 excelling in their study of George Orwell's Animal Farm, Year 8 enjoying Dracula, and Year 9 delving into conflict writing, which should prepare them well for their Year 10 poetry scheme.



In February, 47 learners across Years 9, 10 and 11 took part in the Intermediate Maths Challenge, a multiple-choice maths exam designed to challenge the best GCSE students. All learners performed amazingly well, resulting in 4 gold awards, 11 silver and 10 bronze, with Dawoud Alam and Mohammed Asharab, both Year 11, also qualifying for the Pink Kangaroo round, a national competition open to only the top 8000 learners across Britain.


To mark National Apprenticeship Week, Balaaj Bhatti, an ex-learner of Ninestiles, returned to school to talk with almost 200 Year 10 learners about his education journey after leaving Ninestiles, the path he has taken to be studying economics at Warwick University, and the exciting opportunities open to our learners in the field of economics and finance. Our learners were engaged and asked intelligent questions to further their understanding of the field and took away several tips from Balaaj that they could implement that would set them apart from other learners when they apply for university courses or apprenticeships in the future. Across the school, learners have taken to and embedded the new Sparx maths programme into their weekly maths homework and revision routines. Learners have completed 1.6 times as many questions as at this time last year from the old Hegarty maths programme, equating to almost three quarters of a million more questions attempted.





Geography

In January, the Geography team was able to take over 150 Year 11 students to conduct their human fieldwork. The students were researching around the benefits and consequences to regeneration in Coventry city centre. Students built their confidence up through the day whilst completing questionnaires with locals and building up relationships with store owners and the West Midlands Police force. Within the classroom, our KS3 students have been looking into the possibility of being able to feed 9 billion people by 2050, the economic development of the Middle Eastern countries, and travelling through the Americas to see the physical and human global influence countries have. The Options process has also secured over 170 students in Year 9 wanting to continue with their Geography studies at GCSE level – we look forward to teaching them from September!

Philosophy & Ethics

Wishing everyone a happy Vaisakhi and Easter. We hope all our students have a restful break. Philosophy and Ethics are excited to have the opportunity to study the GCSE through Years 9 and 10. We feel enthusiastic and this sentiment has shown in students' work and engagement with GCSE content since beginning to teach this. Modern foreign Languages


In the MFL department, Japanese Club continues this term with learners taking part in sushi and origami classes, as well as learning how to discuss traditional Japanese culture. In lessons, Year 7 have been describing where they live, Year 8 are learning about French or Spanish music and cinema, and Year 9 are talking about their plans for the future. In Key Stage 4, Year 10 have learnt how schools are different in French and Spanish speaking countries and are beginning to prepare for their PPEs. We are extremely proud of the hard work Year 11 have put into their PPE exams - the countdown is on until the GCSEs! Several learners are preparing to undertake GCSE exams in their home language (Arabic, Panjabi, Bengali, Turkish, Urdu and Italian).

History

To tie in with National Holocaust Memorial Day on 27th January, we welcomed Danny Collman into school to talk to our GCSE History students. Danny had sadly lost his grandparents, aunts and uncles in the Holocaust and so he was able to share his very personal connection with the Holocaust with our students. All our students were incredibly respectful and asked some really important questions that Danny was happy to answer. It was a very special experience.
























Year 7


Having investigated how cams and gears work, learners have researched the wonderful and playful work of designer Matt Smith before coming up with their very own moving toy design ideas.

Through the making process, learners have had experience of using hand tools in the workshop environment, where in particular they have developed the skill of using wooden dowel to strengthen the joints on their toy frames. Once all of the mechanisms were tested and operational, students then completed their automata by adding colour and decoration to bring their designs to life. enough to eat!




















NEWS from: Science

Geobus

It was great working alongside @GeoBus_UCL with our Year 7s in Science, looking at planets and earthquakes during the workshop via zoom. Learners enjoyed the session and were inspired to learn more about seismology.

Geobus is an outreach programme run by the Science department of UCL to support STEM in schools. The session was thoroughly enjoyed and was an engaging and hands on experience with the use of great resources and 3D glasses which all pupils loved. The workshop complemented our topic of Waves within the KS3 curriculum, allowing pupils to gauge a greater understanding of seismic waves. Learners were definitely inspired and were excited to complete a 3D model representing tectonic plates.



The Trust Scientific Literacy Competition

Ninestiles is now working in partnership with The Ogden Trust to promote the teaching and learning of Physics. The Trust Scientific Literacy Competition had to be related to space. British Science Week



- Ophthalmic Science.


